

BRUNO CONTINI

Bruno Contini, born in 1936, is professor of econometrics and applied economics at the University of Torino since 1971, founder and director of the LABORatorio R. Revelli, Centre for Employment Studies at CORIPE Piemonte, Member of the Accademia delle Scienze di Torino.

A graduate at Bocconi University in Milano, he has a Ph.D. in Economics from the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh (1966). Assistant Professor at the University of California, Berkeley; (1965-68), Visiting Professor at U.C. Berkeley, London School of Economics, Tel-Aviv University, Princeton University. He has published in many fields of theoretical and empirical economics. In the last twenty years his research interests have focussed on the analyses of labour markets and the economics of ageing. His last books, Labour Mobility and Wage Dynamics in Italy (2002), and Eppur si muove: persistenze e dinamiche nel mercato del lavoro (with U. Trivellato, 2005) summarize much of his research efforts since the Nineties.

He has been a consultant of the European Commission, DG V for almost a decade since the mid Eighties, and a Council Member of the Italian Statistical Institute (ISTAT). His numerous consulting assignments include the World Bank, Eurostat, Istituto Nazionale della Previdenza Sociale, Italian Ministry of Welfare and Labour.

Member of the Accademia delle Scienze di Torino, he is the winner of the 1993 Saint Vincent Prize in Economics (with the late R. Revelli), and was awarded the E. Tarantelli Prize for Research in Labour Economics (first edition, 1997).
